(3) SYLLABUS

Social Psychology is the scientific study of the individual and group behavior. The course follows the four different levels of psychosocial analysis according to Doise; individual, intra-group, inter-group and ideological. The first level of social psychology covers topics such as; methodology in social psychology, attitudes formation, group behavior and social norms, inter-group relations, phenomena of social influence, experiments of Milgram and Zimbardo. Social identity theory and self-categorization are presented and discussed.
