(3) SYLLABUS

The basic theoretical and methodological approach followed aims at examining and analyzing contemporary economic and social structures that attribute to the Greek social formation the individual structural characteristics within the European and International framework. The economic and social dimension of development, along with their mutual interaction, is specialized into a system that may explain the developmental perspectives of contemporary Greece. The course is oriented towards the interdisciplinary treatment of economic phenomena, targeting at the diagnosis of founding concepts' character and policies that are related to economic and social development. The recent economic crisis and the long term economic and social consequences caused create the need to interpret the current reality and to design and implement appropriate policies within the new economic and social environment. Based on the above analysis and through the prism of social theorization of development, the particular themes that will be analyzed during the length of the courses pertain to the analysis of the transition to the aforementioned structures, the evolution of industry, agriculture and services sector in addition to income, social economy and competitiveness. The morphology of the Greek crisis is studied, as well as the division of labor, social and economic development. Particular emphasis is put into the empirical foundation of theoretical concepts and to the presentation of available data, while adopted policies are also analyzed.
