(3) SYLLABUS

The seminar aims at analysing migration through the lens of gender. In opposition to theories that look at migration of people in general, the seminar will emphasize on the distinct characteristics of women on the move as well as their relation to the labour markets of host countries. Initially, emphasis will be placed on the theoretical approaches that explain the need for a distinct analysis of female migration. After that the focus will be on specific case studies that link gendered migration with work, nationality and refugee status.
