(3)SYLLABUS

The course analyses the development of the philosophical thought of Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels, as well as key positions within Marxism (Rosa Luxemburg, Lenin's philosophical thought, the work of Lukács, Gramsci, and Althusser), with the aim of familiarising students with the fundamental questions of this particular school of thought, clarifying concepts that have shaped subsequent debates, and establishing links between Marxist ideas and other schools of thought in the history of philosophy.

- The course consists of thirteen lectures covering the following topics:
- Introductory lecture
- The critique of bourgeois politics in the early Marx
- The 1844 Manuscripts and the problem of alienation
- The emergence of historical materialism
- Critique of political economy
- The late Marx
- The philosophical intervention of Friedrich Engels
- The interventions of Rosa Luxemburg
- The philosophical thought of V. I. Lenin
- The intervention of Georg Lukács
- Antonio Gramsci: hegemony and the philosophy of praxis
- The reformulation of Marxist philosophy by Louis Althusser
- - Conclusions of the course.
